Think about which issues they care about

Think about what would motivate you to vote

EXAMPLE

"Jon, you know health care has been a really important issue for me and my family—it affects us directly with these pre-existing conditions. I know you don't usually get involved in politics, but will you promise me that you'll vote this year? I'm kind of counting on people like you to come out, so I can't not ask. You know?"

EXAMPLE

"Hey Alexis, what are you doing November 6?
I don't know if you've seen what's been going on in D.C., but this year's election is going to be really important. I just need to ask you if you'll take 30 minutes to come out and vote this year. You know I wouldn't be asking if this wasn't important."

Hi Auntie Sarah,

I hope all is well! I'm challenging myself to help everyone in my network to vote in the midterm elections on Nov 6. If you need any info about when and where to go, you can get started at ofa.bo/voter-plan
